TOP-TIER COOPERATIVE

Member-owned electric cooperatives serve about 75% of the land area in the U.S. and have been called one of the greatest self-help projects ever.

(Electric co-op territories are designated in red on map.)

Located in geographic areas where there was little to no hope of receiving electric service, people banded together to form their own electric utility, starting in the early 1900's.

Today, cooperatives enjoy some of the highest consumer satisfaction ratings in the U.S. compared to other businesses and service providers. CVEC has set a goal to become one of the best of the best, a toptier electric cooperative. This will require that members find that CVEC works to keep

rates as low as possible and has a plan to have the highest reliability. Put simply, do member-owners find that their cooperative is a good value and has their best interest in mind?

Over the past five years, CVEC has been reducing average outage minutes per member and has a plan to keep moving on that path. You can

During the same time, CVEC has made a transition in how it buys power, from a low-cost, long term wholesale energy contract, to a wholesale market dominated by traders and investments bankers, as well as a transmission organization that has shifted costs away from the big power generation companies to utility customers and cooperative members.

TOP-TIER COOPERATIVE

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CVEC has responded by building a power portfolio that features 20+ different contracts and power sources with varying fuels and durations. This portfolio provides the lowest, most stable source of power to cooperative members from a wholesale energy market structured to benefit the wealthy and powerful.

Despite all of the challenges facing rural utilities, the cost of electric energy has barely doubled since 1937. Today, electricity is more important than ever, powering the comfort of heat in the winter and air conditioning in the summer, as well as all of the appliances and gadgets that deliver convenience to our families. While electric energy is a great value, CVEC wants members to receive the best bargain in electric service and report a high level of satisfaction.




One Big Step to Improve Reliability:

A Redundant Transmission Feed from Albemarle to the James

CVEC serves more than 6,000 members adjacent to the I-64 corridor from Keswick to Goochland through four interconnected substations: Zion, Henson's Store, Ferncliff, and Shannon Hill. Henson's Store now includes members formerly served by the Trevillians Metering Point.

Unlike urban and suburban systems where power can be distributed from two different directions, CVEC receives power at one location and feeds those substations in a straight line. When there is an issue with the transmission system, many Cooperative members are affected and CVEC must await power restoration by the transmission company.

As a solution, CVEC has planned and has been constructing an internal transmission line that will provide an alternate feed to the Zion substation. Most of the line is built. CVEC is working through the planning requirements for a very short section in one remaining county before the line can be connected at the Cash's Corner substation in Albemarle County. This separate transmission line will provide the redundancy needed to keep the lights on when trouble occurs beyond the CVEC distribution system.



I-64 corridor is the fastest growing area on the CVEC grid with our aggregate load jumping from 24 MW in 2000 to 44 MW in 2010. Future development will include more homes, businesses and a shopping center.

What in the World is that PCA?

If you study your electric bill, as most of us do, you will likely have noticed a PCA or Power Cost Adjustment charge. It has always been on the bill, sometimes a fraction of a penny charged or a fraction of a penny credit. This year, the PCA has been higher, more noticeable, and painful to the pocketbook!

So what is it?

In the "old days" the adjustment provided a true-up, or reconciliation, for the cost of fuel to run the generators that produced the wholesale electricity. More recently, the CVEC PCA has provided a true-up for differences in wholesale electricity costs from month to month. This year the costs are higher because of higher costs associated with peak events from the January 2014 Polar Vortex. All costs and savings used in calculating the PCA factor are the actual costs or savings received by CVEC in its wholesale power bills without mark up.

CVEC is working to limit the impact of the costs that are passed through the PCA. We are also looking for ways to stabilize the factor to avoid the monthly fluctuations. If you have more questions about the specifics of what is in the PCA, call our Member Service Department at CVEC. •

Do you pay your power bill at BB&T?

The option to pay your bill at a BB&T branch stopped at the beginning of September 2015. BB&T gave CVEC customers an info sheet throughout August informing of this change.

So how else do you pay?

Soon you can choose your pay date!

Want to pay your CVEC bill soon after YOU get paid ... no problem! Starting in October, if you are a good paying member, you will be able to choose the date your payment comes due.

What is "good paying"?

- Two or fewer late payments in the past 12 months.
- No disconnects in past 36 months.
- Been a CVEC member for at least 12 months.

What are the details?

A member can ...

- ... select a date between the 1st and 25th day of the month.
- ... stay on auto bank draft OR use Western Union Speedpay online/phone options.
- ... enroll as of October 1, 2015.

Be aware that the first bill with this option may be higher or lower than normal as we adjust for shorter or longer billing periods! •

- » created to collaboratively produce or purchase.


Cooperatives work in all parts of the economy, from:




